A. Location

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The primary source for potable water is from lake reservoirs such as Lake Hefner located in North Oklahoma City. Rural areas are supplied by either wells or rural water systems.

Natural Gas for the Oklahoma City Service Area is abundant and, in general, supplied by Oklahoma Natural Gas Company. Rural areas may use bottled gas (propane).

Electricity is supplied by the Oklahoma Gas and Electric Company. The rural areas are served through electrical co-ops. Both sources provide electricity to the majority of homes in the area.

Telephone services are widespread and are supplied by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in the Oklahoma City Service Area. The non-availability of telephone service is not a common problem in this service area. However, many Indian families cannot afford to pay for telephone services, which can be quite expensive in rural areas.

Television is widespread and with the rapid spread of cable and satellite systems, almost every small town has access to cable or satellite television. Otherwise, reception is limited to Oklahoma City stations and public television.

G. Education

Public Schools are located in every small city or town in the Service Area for grades 1-12. There are also a number of private high schools within the Oklahoma City Service Area.

The five campuses of the Metro Technology Centers are also spread throughout Oklahoma City. A variety of training and career programs are offered, including Accounting, Information Technology, and Health Professions such as Nursing and Clinical Laboratory.

The University of Oklahoma Health Science Center is also located in Oklahoma City. This institution offers degrees in a variety of fields, as well as a Medical and Dental School.

H. Economy

Oklahoma County is the economic center of the state. It is the chief market for the state's livestock and agricultural industries, as well as the major wholesaling and jobbing center for the area. The major sources of income in central Oklahoma are oil, agriculture, manufacturing, business, and government. The leading medical center in the state is located in Oklahoma City, employing tens of thousands of people.

Many Indians are employed in local services and trades, or in the governmental services. However, the majority derive their incomes through seasonal or part-time employment at relatively low paying jobs.

I. Social and Political

As a result of the Bureau of Indian Affairs Relocation Program during the 1950s and 1960s and other employment opportunities, large numbers of American Indian and Alaska Natives moved

to metropolitan locations throughout the United States. The American Indian Policy Review Commission, established by the Congress, in 1976 estimated that as many as 160,000 American Indians and Alaska Natives were relocated to urban centers during the BIA Relocation Program.

In order to address the serious and growing problem of lack of access to basic health care, a number of the larger cities established volunteer Indian centers and free health clinics. In 1976, Congress passed the Health Care Improvement Act, which provided authority for urban health program through its Title V. This provision authorized the IHS to provide funding to health programs serving urban Indian populations.

Beginning in 1974 as an Indian-controlled, nonprofit corporation, Oklahoma City Indian Clinic operates with the singular purpose of serving the health care needs of American Indians in central Oklahoma. Oklahoma City Indian Clinic continued to grow and expand programs, and in 1995 began serving patients from its new Medical Facility, delivering a wide range of services including medical, prenatal, dental, pharmacy and optometry, as well as family, behavioral and substance abuse counseling and treatment. The clinic provides X-ray, ultrasound, lab and mammography services.

Prior to the 1950s, most American Indians resided on reservations, in nearby rural towns or in tribal jurisdictional areas. During this area, the federal government passed legislation that resulted in policies designed to assimilate Indian people into the mainstream American society. These policies enticed Indian families living on impoverished Indian reservations to relocate to various urbanized areas across the country.

Today, 66 percent of all American Indians identified in the 2000 Census reside in urban area.
