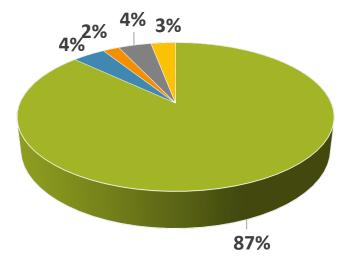


California Recurring Area Budget FY Ending September 30, 2020

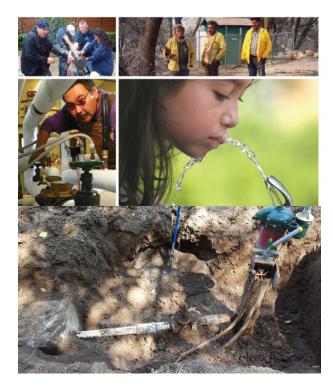




Sanitation Facilities Construction (SFC) Program

Construction activities and the flow of construction materials were impacted by the Pandemic. The months of April and May of 2020 saw projects stop until safety protocols were put into place. Safety Protocols included masks, and equipment cleaning, social distancing, and allowed construction to continue. At this time SFC is fully operational.

Government Performance & Results Act (GPRA) Update

California Area Tribal and Urban health programs met the targets for 3 of 26 GPRA measures in FY 2020. Due to the impact of COVID-19, it was expected that all Areas would struggle to meet the FY 2020 targets for GPRA. In all 12 IHS Areas, the number of measures that met targets ranged from 2 to 4.

Beginning in FY 2018, GPRA was reported through the Integrated Data Collection System (IDCS) at the National Data Warehouse (NDW)

- This has allowed all health programs to report for GPRA, including non-RPMS programs
- There are still some known issues with the data exports for non-RPMS sites. Data for a small subset of measures is not coming through properly, but IHS is aware of the issue and is working with some health programs to remedy the issues





RPMS Replacement

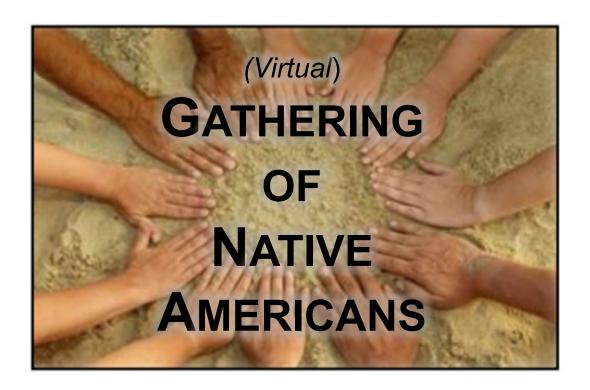
IHS has made the decision to move forward with full replacement of the Resource and Patient Management System (RPMS)

Next Steps:

- Engagement with Department of Defense and Veterans Affairs to learn from their experiences initiating new electronic medical records systems
- Hiring and onboarding of staff to support the Project Management
 Office
- Distribution of Request for Information (RFI) to vendors to provide insight and further inform requirements
- Initiation of acquisition process, including appropriate acquisition vehicle
