

61% say that affordability of care is a barrier.





Trust in a Potential Alzheimer's Cure


Percent Who Trust a Cure Will Be Shared Regardless of Race/Ethnicity



Equity in Neuroscience and Alzheimer's Clinical Trials (ENACT) Act


Expand access and increase outreach to underrepresented populations

Native Americans

- Prevalence of diabetes, heart disease, cigarette smoking and traumatic brain injury are high among AI/AN populations.
