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Funding Opportunities

Cooperative Agreements

- Funding Announcement Number: HHS-2023-IHS-ALZ-0001
- Eligibility: Tribes, Tribal Organizations, and Urban Indian Organizations. Cannot be an existing Dementia program awardee.
- Federal Register Publication: <u>Addressing Dementia in Indian Country:</u> Models of Care
- Funding Amount: Awards of between \$100,000 and \$200,000 per year for 2 years
- Anticipate 6 awards
- Application period end date: June 27, 2023

Program Awards

- Eligibility: IHS Service Units working in partnership with the Tribe(s) and Nations that they serve under the condition that the Tribe(s) or Nations served by the IHS Service Unit have elected not to apply for a Cooperative Agreement (above)
- Application Materials: <u>Program Award Information & Fillable Application</u> <u>Template</u>
- Funding: Awards of either up to \$50,000 or up to \$200,000 per year for two years
- Anticipate up to \$600,000 in awards
- Application period end date: June 12, 2023

5 Key Elements of Comprehensive Care – Drivers

Awareness & Recognition

Opportunities in the community and clinic to increase awareness Understanding risk factors for dementia Reduce stigma

Accurate & Timely Diagnosis

Early recognition and diagnosis
Capability to diagnose in primary care, with specialty care as a resource
as needed or complex cases
Patient and family aware of diagnosis

Interdisciplinary, Person-centered Assessment

Clinical, functional, and social assessment Identification of needs / gaps in care

Management & Referral

Slow progression

Care planning and advanced care planning Anticipate and address challenges

Resources to meet needs / gaps Assemble support

Support for Caregivers

Identification and Care for the Caregiver is integral to care for the person living with dementia

DEMENTIA MODELS of CARE LOGIC MODEL SAMPLE

AIM: Improve the provision of culturally competent care, services, and outcomes for American Indian and Alaska Native people living with dementia and their caregivers

5 Primary Drivers: 1.) Increase Awareness and Recognition of dementia; 2.) Make an Accurate and Timely Diagnosis; 3.) Provide an Interdisciplinary Assessment to identify need for services and an appropriate plan of care for people living with dementia and their caregivers; 4.) Provide comprehensive, person-centered Management and Referral to meet needs; and 5.) Support Caregivers.

1. Increase Awareness and Recognition of dementia

PRIMARY DRIVER What will be necessary to meet our aim?	SECONDARY DRIVERS - EXAMPLES What are the steps or components necessary for this driver?	STRATEGIES - EXAMPLES Some examples of specific strategies related to this driver.
Increase Awareness and Recognition of Dementia	Select and implement an early detection strategy	Use a standard screening tools (e.g. Mini-Cog) Identify the triggers for screening in various settings Train in screening in various clinical settings (for example: oral health, pharmacy, Public Health and Community Health Nursing, Community Health Representatives)
Example Measures: Rates of dementia # of referrals from community for assessment # of staff or Tribal orgs trained in early detection	Create opportunities for detection of cognitive impairment	Use a Well Elder Visit or the Medicare Annual Wellness Visit as an opportunity to assess for cognitive impairment Assess for cognitive impairment and delirium in the Emergency Department and make referral to PCP
	Educate in the 10 warning signs for dementia	Train front-line staff in warning signs and care pathways Adapt the warning signs for dementia and other dementia education materials to the Tribe's culture and language Use Community or Tribal meetings, Health Fairs, or social media for education opportunities
	Coordinate with community-based organizations touching the elderly	Collaborate with senior center / elder services Financial institutions, local grocers and shops Law enforcement Post Office and Tribal buildings

For 2023 applicants, the evaluation plan should, at a minimum, include performance measures about the number of persons newly diagnosed with dementia, the number of persons living with a pre-existing dementia diagnosis, screening measures, and case-finding efforts among their patient population.
