The Community Opioid Intervention Pilot Project (COIPP)



COIPP expanded access to treatment and care in American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/AN) communities. Grantees demonstrated resilience and innovation, building evidence-based strategies with traditionally grounded care to expand their impact and reach.

Objectives in Action

- Trauma-Informed care, rooted in heritage-based healing.
- Expanded access to Medication for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD).
- Reduced stigma through heritage-informed awareness.
- Strengthening service workforce by investing in training and quality.
- Strengthened the circle of care from education to recovery.

Overdose Deaths Decreased



Among male patients overdose deaths dropped 50% and referrals to opioid treatment doubled over the three year project.

Training



The COIPP delivered training on Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) care to both community members and healthcare professionals equally.

Naloxone Saves Lives

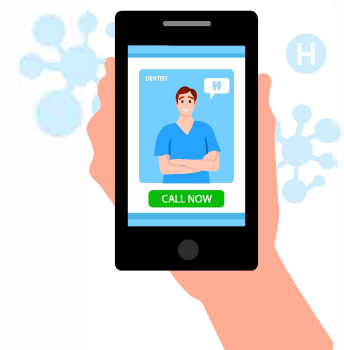


Naloxone useage among community members increased from 71% to 83%.



Group Therapy

Sessions Increased 5X from Year 1 to Year 3.



Innovation

Project doubled MOUD provider access through telemedicine.
