## Wisconsin State Tribal Relations

- Federally-Recognized Tribes: Eleven
- State Tribal Consultation Policy: In 2004, Executive Order #39 was issued, recognizing the government-to-government relationship between the state and tribal governments and requiring strengthening of the working relationship between the two governments. As a result, the State-Tribal Consultation Initiative was created (see <a href="http://witribes.wi.gov/">http://witribes.wi.gov/</a>). Nearly all of the agencies in the Governor's Cabinet have drafted policies which establish a framework for interaction with tribes. These policies were drafted with input from representatives of all of Wisconsin's tribal governments at meetings hosted by the state's 11 tribes. The policies state that whenever the agencies consider programs or initiatives that would affect tribes, they share this information with them. Conversely, whenever tribes have an issue with the state, the Initiative establishes processes through which these can be shared with state government. Through the Initiative, valuable state and tribal resources are put to more effective use delivering government services in a more streamlined, coordinated and economically efficient manner.
