Indigenous storywork

- Jo-Ann Archibald
 - Indigenous Storywork
 - Decolonizing Research Indigenous Storywork as Methodology
- Worked with Coast Salish Elders and storytellers to develop ways of bringing storytelling into educational contexts
- Demonstrates how stories have power to educate and heal the heart, mind, body, and spirit.

What is storywork?

- Storywork brings together Indigenous ways of knowing and leading.
- Teaches how to remain connected to the land and to one another.
- The teacher transmitted through specific Elders and educators.
- Framework is based on 7 principles.
- Appropriate path for delivery of Indigenous intellectual traditions and Elders' knowledge, thus providing additional guiding framework for leadership.
- Provides a reflective process for self-discovery

Background on the field – today's world

Digital storytelling

- Center for Digital Storytelling, i.e., StoryCenter...
- Developed original digital storytelling methodology in 1993
- Lengthy history of collaborative storytelling and media efforts worldwide
- Broad range of approaches, all of which emphasize:

- first person narrative
- group process
- participatory production
- storywork



What is Digital Storytelling

- Uses new digital tools to help ordinary people to tell their own real-life stories
- is the practice of combining narrative with digital content, including images, sound, and video, to create a short movie, typically with a strong emotional component.
- can be instructional, persuasive, historical, or reflective.
- is normally 2-5 minutes long
- Can be effectively applied to nearly any subject

Digital storytelling basics:
