I spent much of my summer conducting food service sanitation surveys of various establishments, including restaurants, school cafeterias, food warehouses, and more. I gained knowledge and confidence in food inspections throughout the summer, and by the end I was able to complete them independently. I conducted additional safety inspections of health clinics and construction environments. In addition, I completed trainings and received certificates in various subjects including food safety and food service inspections, pool inspections, OSHA construction safety, and more.

In addition to environmental health inspections, I was given the opportunity to create a project based on my own interest and expertise in environmental health. I used this opportunity to research vectorborne diseases in the pacific northwest, and what risk they pose to the tribes served by the Portland Area Office. Using this information, I created a report describing the risk vectorborne diseases may pose to these communities and what actions could be taken to prevent illness in the future.

Overall, my time as a JRCOSTEP provided me with invaluable professional and cultural experiences. This program allowed me to learn many different environmental health skills, while simultaneously exposing me to new cultural experiences that educated and improved me as a person.
