Dear Tribal and Urban Indian Organization Leaders:

It is truly an honor to continue serving our American Indian and Alaska Native people as the newly confirmed Indian Health Service director. I also thank the President and <u>HHS Secretary</u> for entrusting me with this responsibility and appreciate the confidence shown by the Senate confirmation. I remain committed to advocating for Indian country, especially as we fight the coronavirus disease. To that end, last week, Secretary Azar <u>renewed</u> the Public Health Emergency Determination, recognizing the continued threat that the Coronavirus disease poses to our communities. The IHS remains resolute in combatting the COVID-19 epidemic through our partnerships with Tribes, Urban Indian organizations, and through our cross coordinated efforts with our federal, state and local partners.

On April 24th, I met with the FEMA Administrator Pete Gaynor and our other federal partners during the daily COVID-19 FEMA and HHS Interagency teleconference. As the entire federal government continues to fight this epidemic with a whole-of-government response, FEMA and HHS are collecting and sharing best practices and lessons learned. The FEMA Coronavirus Emergency Management Best Practices are intended to help medical practitioners, emergency managers, and other critical stakeholders learn from each other's approaches and apply solutions to current response and recovery operations. I encourage you to explore these best practices and contribute your ideas for how we are combatting COVID-19 in Indian Country.

On <u>April 23</u>, we issued a letter announcing the final allocation for the remaining \$367 million of the \$1.032 billion provided to the agency in the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. This funding was allocated across the Indian Health system to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus pandemic. These resources are in addition to the \$600 million in funding from the CARES Act already allocated to IHS, Tribes, and Urban Indian Healthcare programs, and the \$134 million in funding from the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, and the Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act. Thank you for providing critical input throughout this process during Tribal Consultation and Urban Confer sessions.

In response to the numerous questions the IHS has received from Tribes and Urban Indian Health organizations requesting guidance on COVID-19 funding distributions, the IHS has developed <u>COVID-19 Funding Guidance for Tribes, Tribal Organizations, and Urban Indian</u> <u>Organizations.</u>

On April 22, <u>HHS announced</u> the allocation plan for the remaining CARES Act <u>Provider Relief</u> <u>Fund</u>. This provided an additional \$400 million for the IHS, Tribal, and Urban Indian Health programs. This allocation also includes \$10 billion for Hospitals in High Impact Areas or areas with high rates of COVID-19 infection and/or hospitalizations. I want to remind you all that the HHS is currently engaged in Tribal Consultation on its Fiscal Year 2022 HHS Budget Request. The deadline for Tribal leaders to submit written testimony to <u>consultation@hhs.gov</u> is this **Friday, May 1**. Resources to assist Tribes in making recommendations can be found <u>here</u>.

All of the <u>250 Abbott ID now COVID-19 analyzer machines</u> that the IHS received have been <u>distributed</u>. Over the past month, IHS has expanded testing capacity from 98 sites to 298 sites boosted mostly by the distribution of these analyzer machines. These sites include locations in some of our most rural and vulnerable populations. We continue to find other ways to expand testing. The IHS utilizes all methods of testing for COVID-19, including state or regional public health labs, in-house point-of-care testing, commercial labs that have sufficient processing capacity that some Indian healthcare sites may not have, and our academic partners. With this expansion in testing capability across the Indian health system we do expect to see an increase in the number of positive cases reported. We continue to follow CDC guidelines to determine who should be tested. For more information about testing, please visit ihs.gov/coronavirus for answers to frequently asked questions on testing.

Please continue to join us on our weekly Thursday <u>Indian Country COVID-19 Response team call</u> where we will work with our partners across the federal government to provide critical updates and information on how we are working together to address COVID-19. This week's call will focus on testing. In addition, <u>every Tuesday</u> the IHS meets with Urban Indian Organization leaders so that they can provide comments and ask questions of our federal officials. We hope you will join us.
