Dear Tribal and Urban Indian Organization Leaders,

At the IHS we value our partnerships with tribes, tribal organizations, and urban Indian health organizations. I am committed to sharing weekly updates on ways we are partnering to combat COVID-19 in Indian Country.

Last Friday, the President announced <u>Operation Warp Speed (OWS)</u>, which aims to have substantial quantities of a safe and effective vaccine available by January 2021. In addition to OWS, the President also released a plan to <u>restructure the Strategic National Stockpile (SNS)</u> to ensure a fully stocked, resilient national stockpile, and a domestic industrial base capable of meeting future challenges. As these developments move forward, the IHS will continue to look for ways to leverage these opportunities to fight the coronavirus in Indian Country.

On May 9, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services <u>announced shipments of donated Remdesivir</u> for hospitalized patients with COVID-19. As part of the allocation plan announcement, IHS received Emergency Use Authorization from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to immediately distribute 800 vials of the drug Remdesivir to 14 IHS federal and tribal hospitals across 6 IHS Areas. We expect to receive an additional allocation of 3,200 vials very soon.

The IHS will continue to focus on getting supplies to meet the needs across the Indian health system. I commend the hard work of our <u>National Supply Service Center</u> in using every avenue available to secure personal protective equipment and supplies. To date, we have delivered more than 35 million gloves and 7 million N95 masks across our health system.

To maximize capacity to treat acutely ill patients, the IHS <u>expanded telehealth services</u> to conserve supplies and provide access to healthcare services to the people we serve from the privacy of their own homes. On May 14, the <u>Northern Cheyenne Service Unit</u> in the <u>Billings Area</u> expanded specialty care services for dermatology, endocrinology, wound management, and rheumatology. These telehealth services allow local providers to refer patients to see

specialists by a virtual clinic appointment. The Billings Area IHS plans to expand tele-specialty services to all its service units by August 2020.

Last week, the IHS released a <u>Trauma Informed Care Policy</u>, which guides IHS in delivering trauma-informed care services and simultaneously prepares our workforces to be trauma informed. We acknowledge the role that trauma plays in the lives of American Indian and Alaska Native populations, specifically Native youth who are 2-and-a-half-times more likely to experience trauma compared to their non-Native peers. Delivering trauma-informed services requires an understanding of the profound effects trauma and violence can have on individuals, families, and communities. Through the use of trauma-informed policies, practices, and interventions, we can enhance our capacity for promoting relational well-being and improve patient outcomes.

This week, on Thursday, May 21 at 3:00 p.m. ET, we invite you to attend a special presentation hosted by the Administration for Native Americans, entitled: "Trauma: Staying Connected." The presentation will address the methods through which people can stay connected with each other and cope with trauma in healthy ways.

Thank you for your continued engagement as we address COVID-19 in Indian Country together. We encourage you to visit our IHS coronavirus webpage for the latest information.
