ACT Ambassadors Pilot Program

The IHS National Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee (NPTC) is actively seeking ACT Ambassadors in tribal communities served by federal direct care, tribal, and Urban Indian Organization programs as part of the IHS National Strategic Initiative- Asthma Control in Tribal Communities (ACT).

Participation

Participation as an IHS ACT Ambassador is recommended for clinical, public health, and environmental health professionals and teams with asthma-related expertise operating at I/T/U facilities and in tribal communities.

Individuals and teams interested in participating in the ACT Ambassadors Pilot Program are asked to submit a brief ACT Ambassadors Program Application consisting of the following to ihsmedsafety@ihs.gov;

- 1) Name and professional discipline(s) of the applicant ACT Ambassador (individual and/or team).
- 2) Location and tribal community/communities served.
- 3) Brief narrative (200 words or less) describing your asthma-related project and objectives related to asthma awareness, early recognition/diagnosis, control and/or improved outcomes in Indian Country.

Upon receipt of a completed application from an eligible I/T/U site, each individual/team will receive a letter of designation as an Indian Health Service ACT Ambassador.
