## **SDPI Overview**

- In response to rising rates of diabetes in AI/AN people, Congress established SDPI through the Balanced Budget Act of 1997 (P.L. 105-33)
  - "The Secretary shall make grants for providing services for the prevention and treatment of diabetes..." (42 USC 254c-3)
- Today SDPI provides funds to 302 I/T/U grant programs in 35 states for diabetes prevention and treatment
  - Tribal 256
  - Urban 31
  - IHS 15



During the 2023 budget period, grantees will implement their selected Best Practice activities/services, as well as track and report data on their Target Group for their Required Key Measure (RKM).



## Required Key Measure (RKM)

Topic	Importance	Required Key Measure	Target Group Guidance
Nutrition Education	Nutrition education helps reduce the risk for developing diabetes and its complications.	Number and percent of individuals in your Target Group who receive nutrition education.*  * Performed by a Registered Dietitian or other health or wellness program staff.	Select from adults and/or youth with diabetes and/or at risk for developing diabetes.

## **Using SDPI Diabetes Best Practices**

Applicants choosing the same Best Practice may propose different activities/services with different Target Groups. See the example below.

SDPI Program	Selected Best Practice	Activities/Services	Target Group Description
А	Nutrition Education	Providing nutrition education related to breastfeeding support.	Pregnant women ages 18-30 with or at risk for diabetes from local I/T/U clinic.
В	Nutrition Education	Providing nutrition education related to diabetes prevention.	Youth ages 8-15 at risk for diabetes at local Boys & Girls Club.
С	Nutrition Education	Providing nutrition education from a Registered Dietitian related to <b>heart health</b> .	Adults with diabetes ages 18-45 at risk for CVD from local I/T/U clinic.



#### What is Required for this Grant

All requirements for this grant can be found in the latest Notice of Award (NoA) issuing new funds. A summary of Programmatic Terms and Conditions, or Expectations, are provided below.

#### Expectations

What is expected from me?

- Work with us: You will be working with the Division of Diabetes, the Division of Grants
  Management (DGM) and your Area Diabetes Consultant (ADC). For more information
  on these programs, see step 2 from the <u>Tips for New Project Directors</u> section.
- Project Director: Your program must have a project director who has relevant health
  care education and/or experience. This person should also be the primary contact to
  the Division of Diabetes, DGM and their ADC.
- Implement one Best Practice: Your program must implement activities and/or services towards improving the Required Key Measure of your program's selected SDPI Diabetes Best Practice.
- Report Required Key Measure (RKM) data using the <u>SDPI Outcomes System</u>
   (<u>SOS</u>): The SOS is a web-based data system for SDPI grant programs. All programs must submit RKM data for their Target Group for their selected Diabetes Best Practice via the SOS. At least one person in your program will need to have access to this system to enter RKM data and download reports.
- Attend and track <u>SDPI Required Trainings</u>: The Division of Diabetes hosts trainings that are specific to requirements for grant
  applications, activities and other related topics. It is up to the grant program to attend and keep track of the trainings they attended. All
  trainings are recorded and a training tracking tool is continuously updated for each year.

## 2. Newly Formatted SOS

- Newly formatted SOS coming soon Spring 2023!
  - Mura format similar to SDPI/DDTP websites and WebAudit
    - White menu that expands
    - Website accommodates various screen sizes
    - Different (limited) color scheme
- Most process steps will remain the same except for the Individual Tool
  - Entering individuals and editing RKM will be made available on the same page

## 3. New Best Practice

- Per TLDC recommendation, DDTP will develop Diabetes
   Prevention Best Practice
- Goal is to have this Best Practice available by the time the SDPI 2024 Continuation Application becomes available (July 2023)
